[Student Ability Success Center](#)

The Student Ability Success Center provides services to minimize barriers and ensure equal access for eligible students with disabilities to higher education through academic support services, technology and advocacy.

The Joan and Art Barron Veterans Center is committed to supporting military, military veterans, military spouses, and dependent children in the areas of higher education in outreach/admission, GI Bill benefits, academic success, graduation, and a career.

The location for the Barron Veterans Center is about 4,000 square feet in the heart of campus and serves as a one-stop shop for military connected students. The space accommodates the two Troops to Engineering Coordinators, the SDSU Global Campus Military Veterans Services Representative, and the Military Liaison Officer. This space allows a place for SDSU's veterans and military students to come in and hang out, talk, study, watch TV, and relax.

The mission of Student Life and Leadership (SLL) at San Diego State University is to promote student engagement, development, and success. SLL provides a balanced University experience for our diverse community through teaching, advising, and programming. [Office of the Ombudsman](#)

The Office of the Ombudsman provides information, advice, referrals, and intervention to students at SDSU. The Student Ombudsman is a student-focused resource who supports students in addressing and resolving concerns or issues that may arise within the University, including faculty/staff conflicts, fee disputes, and grade appeals, whether they occur through an in-person interaction or in the virtual environment.

The Student Ombudsman:

- Analyzes your situation, identifies options and helps evaluate them
- Acts as a neutral resource between a student and a faculty/staff member, using informal problem solving techniques
- Works closely with the Student Grievance Committee
- Offers meetings via Zoom or telephone

[Center for Student Rights and Responsibilities](#)

In support of the mission of San Diego State University, the Center for Student Rights and Responsibilities educates campus community members about the Student Code of Conduct and assists in the development of students as good citizens. The Center provides outreach, educational materials, and advisement to students, faculty, and staff regarding the [Student Code of Conduct](#) and other system-wide processes.

The Office of Well-being & Health Promotion offers Health Educators, Community Resource Specialists, and Subject Experts who offer education, HIV testing information, medical referral assistance, sexual health knowledge, STI education, and alcohol/drug-related information.

We also partner with parents and families of SDSU students to support their transition to becoming an SDSU parent through programs and events like Parent and Family Orientation, New Student and Family Convocation, and Family Weekend.

- Participation in Family Weekend, including virtual options
